Part one: Grammar lessons

Lesson 1: Expressing Wish and Regret

Examples:

I wish the present anti-corruption laws **were** tougher. (wish/ about a present situation)

I wish our fellow citizens **had heard** our call for fighting corruption earlier. (Regret about sth in the past)

I wish our government **would pass** anti-corruption laws soon. (Desire for change)

Rule:

- I wish +past simple= wish/Regret about a present situation by imagining its opposite.
- I wish + past perfect= Regret about something in the past.
- I wish + would / would not + stem = desire for change in the near future. (Soon, someday...)
- Be careful: we say I wish **I/ we could** .. . Not I wish I would...
- **“Were”** is used instead of “was” after wish with all the subject pronouns.

Lesson 2: It's High Time/ It's About Time

Examples:

It's high time we **organized** ourselves into an anti corruption association.

It's about time we **fought** pollution.

Rule:

It's high time= it's about time

1. It's (high/about) time+ past simple = means that the action should have been done earlier. (it is a complaint or a criticism).

Lesson:3 As Long As/Providing That/ Provided That...

Examples:

[We will eradicate corruption] [**Providing that** we act now] .

Main clause: the result
The future

Subordinate clause : the condition
Present simple

[We will win]

[**as long as** we work together as a team]

Main clause: the result
The future

Subordinate clause : the condition
Present simple

Rule: **If / but only if/provided that/ providing that/ as long as** + subject+ present simple (,
subject+ future simple.

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Or: subject+ future simple+ **provided that/providing that/if/ only if/ as long as**+ subject+ present simple.

Lesson :4 Expressing Advice

Examples:

“**Had better**” and “**had better not**” are used to express advice or recommendation.

Examples:

1) You 'd **better /had better** take your umbrella with you today.

Had better + stem (infinitive without “to”)

2) You **had better not** miss your mathematic classes.

Had better not + stem (infinitive without “to”)

Rule:

- When we want to give **advice** or **recommendation** in English, we use:
- Had better + stem (infinitive without “to”)
- Had better not + stem (infinitive without “to”)

Lesson 5: Expressing Obligation/Prohibition/Lack of Obligation.

Examples:

- Government **must** fight bribery. **Obligation**
- Businessmen **have to** contribute in the fight against bribery. **Obligation**
- The banking system **must not** accept big amounts of money without knowing their source. **Prohibition**
- Ordinary workers **do not have to** declare the source of their money. **Lack of obligation**

Rule:

- **By obligation we mean:** the action that someone have to or must do.
- **By prohibition we mean:** the action that someone must not do.
- **By lack of obligation we mean:** the action that someone is not obliged to do. The doer has the choice between doing it or not. It is also called lack of necessity.
 - To express obligation we use: **must, have to ,has to.**
 - To express prohibition we use: **must not (mustn't)**
 - To express absence or lack of obligation we use: **do/does not have to.**

Lesson 6: “So+adjective+that” and “Such+noun phrase+that”

Examples:

- 1- Counterfeiting is harmful . It should be eradicated.
Counterfeiting is **so** harmful **that** it should be eradicated.
- 2- There are many forms of Counterfeiting. They cannot be easily identified.
There are **so** many forms of Counterfeiting **that** they cannot be easily identified.
- 3- Laundered money is of illegal sources. It is a crime to use it.
Laundered money is of **such** illegal sources **that** it is a crime to use it.

Rule:

To express consequences (results) we use:

Form 1: So + **adjective** +that

Form2: So + **many/much** +that

Form3: such+ **noun phrase** +that
